One of the great honors any of us can receive is to be asked to be a godparent. Over the years I have received this honor twice, and it is something I take very seriously. I have two goddaughters and on this All-Saints' Sunday, Marjie and I will become godparents to Violet Dunn, Carolyn Horne's daughter and Jim and Keith Horne's granddaughter.

If you are present at the service or watching it on live stream you will notice something different. During the presentation and examination of the candidate, I will move from being the celebrant to being a sponsor (godparent) who will be asked the questions during the examination part of the service. The sponsors are asked eight different questions. The first two questions have to do with the responsibility of bringing up the child in the Christian faith, praying for the child and witnessing to help the child grow into the full statue of Christ. These are weighty questions that call for a serious and self-examination response as a godparent. This is a huge responsibility that any godparent takes on and requires action on the part of the godparent. I heard a priest once say that godparents have three responsibilities, 1) to pray for their godchild, 2) to have a relationship with the godchild and 3) to get the godchild out of trouble if that unfortunate situation arises.

The next three questions are about the renunciation of evil. And then the next three are about a commitment to have accepted Jesus as a personal savior, put trust in Jesus and promise to follow him. My understanding is in the ancient world when these questions were asked at a baptism, the candidates and sponsors would turn their bodies and faces away from the altar toward the world and respond to the questions about renouncing Satan and evil forces of the world. When asked about Jesus they would turn to the altar an image of where we as Christians receive God.

One interesting thing about the answers to the questions of examination is that the sponsors don't say that we will do this or we renounce Satan and the evils of this world or we accept Jesus. No, the pronoun is I. Like all things in the Book of Common Prayer these responses are intentional that when someone makes these vows on behalf of the person who is being baptized, the sponsor is personally responsible for the vows he or she makes on behalf of the person who is being baptized.

So on All Saints Sunday, Marjie and I will have the honor and privilege of become godparents to Violet. And with this honor comes a weighted responsibility that all godparents have as we journey in this life with our godchildren.



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The Posada: Join the journey to Bethlehem

We plan to begin our Posada on the First Sunday of Advent, November 28. Since we have had new church members join us since the last Posada, this article is intended to share the history of this tradition and how we celebrate it here at St. John's.

Las Posadas, Spanish for "The Inns," is a commemoration of the journey taken by Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem. The idea can be traced to

St. Ignatius Loyola in the 16th century. Loyola suggested that special prayers be said on nine successive days, the number of days it took the Holy Family to travel to Bethlehem. Spanish missionaries introduced the nine-day remembrance to Indians in Mexico around 1587. The native Mexicans added song and celebration and moved the posada from inside churches into homes.

The traditional Mexican commemoration begins with a procession on December 16. A child dressed as an angel heads the proces-

sion, followed by two more children carrying figures of Mary and Joseph, other children, adults and finally musicians. All in the procession sing and carry a lighted candle or lantern.

When the procession reaches the house chosen for the evening, the participants divide into two groups—the religious pilgrims and the innkeepers. The pilgrims line up behind the angel and the children bearing the figures of Mary and Joseph. The innkeepers are positioned behind a closed (interior) door of the house. The pilgrims knock on the door asking for shelter. The innkeepers



ask, "Who knocks at my door so late in the night?" The pilgrims respond, "In the name of Heaven I beg you for lodging. My beloved wife can no longer travel and she is very weary." But the response is a cold and firm refusal. "Go away! There is no room for you tonight."

After repeated requests, the pilgrims explain who they are, and the innkeepers relent, welcoming

the exhausted travelers. Everyone kneels in prayer. The figures of Mary and Joseph are placed on an altar or Nativity scene. A party filled with fireworks, piñatas, food, song and dance follows the posada. For eight consecutive nights the same ceremonies are repeated at a different home. On the ninth night, Christmas Eve, an image of the Christ Child is carried into the church and laid in a small crib. Midnight mass follows.

Here at St. John's, we begin the tradition on the First Sunday of Advent and our Mary and Joseph figures, created by our own Mary Bet Evans, travel from home to home until Christmas Eve. Any church

member can sign up to be a "host family" for one of the nights and prepare light refreshments for the family that visits your home. The following night, you'll visit the next host family and take Mary and Joseph with you. All participants will follow a printed service as part of the evening.

"I started this tradition at St. John's as a meaningful way to commemorate the trip to Bethlehem as well as an opportunity for our members to spend holiday time together" said Father Tom. "It's quickly become a favorite holiday tradition here."





Prayers of the People

- Q: How do I put someone's name on the St. John's prayer list?
- A: Email Jenn at <u>church.office@sjecpm.org</u> with the person's name.
- Q: How long will the person's name stay on the prayer list?
- A: Three weeks. If you would like the person to stay on longer than three weeks, contact Jenn and she will extend their name for another three weeks.

Q: What's the deadline for getting a name added for a given Sunday?

A: In order for the name to be printed in the Sunday bulletin it will need to be submitted by noon on Wednesday. If someone needs to be added after that, we can write their name on the Prayers of the People that will be read aloud on Sunday, but the name will not be in the bulletin until the following Sunday.

Flower Dedication Sign Up

Q: How do I sign up to give flowers in memory or in celebration of someone?

A: There is a sign-up sheet in the Narthex where you can sign up for a specific Sunday. If you cannot make it to the Church to sign up, you can send Jenn an email at <u>church.office@sjecpm.org</u>

Q: What is the deadline?

A: Please sign up or notify Jenn a minimum of one week prior to the date you would like to give flowers.

Q: What information do I need to provide?

A: The name of the person or event you are wanting the flowers to be dedicated to and the name or family name of who the flowers are from.

Q: What is the cost to give flowers?

A: The suggested donation amount is \$50. If sending a check, please write "flowers" in the memo or notes section of the check.
