There are many things that I am sure we would like to do for them that we can't, but holding them up in prayer is a way for us to meet them in the cross they currently bear which is a cross that many of you have borne as well.

There are many reasons why we might be motivated to give to the church. Some could feel they are paying a "membership fee" and in exchange are receiving something from the church. The "something" could be a deeply moving inspiration, a sense of ensuring the availability of the pastoral offices or to buy entrance into a beneficial moral environment. Some might just want to establish eligibility for other benefits of the church and to know there is a church family for help and support. There is nothing really wrong with wanting any of these things from the church.

Some want to give and see the results of their gifts, perhaps helping those who have a particular need. These people can be referred to as mission-oriented, or sometimes as outreach-motivated. Giving such as this to benefit others is in accordance with the second of Jesus' summary commandments: "Thou shalt love their neighbor as thyself." The greatest reason to give, however, is for our thankfulness and love of God. In this way we are giving to God in gratitude for what we have received from God. In this idea, one is giving without attention to which of God's purposes the gift will be used for. The giver is turning over control of the gift, even indirect control. When the giver totally releases control, the transfer can really be called a gift. Maybe this type of giver never felt they owned what they are giving away anyway! Prayerfully reflect on this: "All things come of thee, O Lord: of Thine own have we given Thee."

Each of us will be challenged to live and give more generously as God has given to us. Please join us in this important endeavor.


