

Dear Friends,

As we enter this Advent season, I have decided to offer a new way for us to gather before the service begins. With the help of Cleamon Downs chanting *a capella* a couple of verses from O Come, O Come Emmanuel for us and a child lighting the Advent candle, we are reminded of our yearning for God to come into our lives. This is a way for us to set apart this time of worship in a season of the year that has all the trappings of drawing us away from the holiness the advent season offers us.

O Come, O Come Emmanuel was originally sung over 1,200 years ago in monastic life in the 8th or 9th century. Seven days before Christmas Eve, monasteries would sing the "O antiphons" in anticipation of Christmas Eve when the eighth antiphon, "O Virgo virginum" ("O Virgin of virgins") would be sung before and after Mary's canticle, the Magnificat (Luke 1:46-55). The Latin metrical form of the hymn was composed as early as the 12th century.

An Anglican priest, John Mason Neal discovered these texts and translated them into English in 1851. The Rev. Neal was a very talented musician who also translated *All Glory Laud and Honor* which we sing on Palm Sunday. These two hymns along with *Good Christian Friends Rejoice*, which the Rev. Neal translated as well, are some of the great hymns December 2022

we have in our hymnal today.

British hymnologist J.R. Watson provides a context for the antiphons (O Come, O Come). "The antiphons, sometimes called the 'O antiphons' or 'The Great O's,' were designated to concentrate the mind on the coming Christmas, enriching the meaning of the Incarnation with a complex series of references from the Old and New Testaments."

It is the incarnation that we are moving toward celebrating during this holy season of Advent. The words incarnation and Emmanuel basically mean the same thing, and that is – God is with us. God is with us during this advent season as we move toward the Christmas season when we recognize him in the flesh among us. So let us recognize the yearning within our souls, O Come O Come Emmanuel!

Latest update on our Outreach Programs

Food Pantry: Providing nutritious food for a growing number of families is the goal of our food pantry program. Through the contributions made by many of you, we have provided nearly 7,200 pounds of food to more than 1,100 people so far this year.

A typical bag of food contains:

- Spaghetti noodles and spaghetti sauce or
- Red beans and rice
- Three cans of vegetables
- Can of tuna
- Can of chicken
- Mac and Cheese
- Large bag of grits
- Peanut butter and jelly

When there are small children in the family, we add baby food, cereal, fruits and cookies, when available.

For the homeless who come to our door, we have pop top items and well as foods that do not require cooking.

One of the highlights of the year is the pre-Thanksgiving ham giveaway with smoked hams donated by the Pascagoula Men's Club. This year, we gave 75 hams to needy families and were able to add a tin of cookies with each ham. Already, we're hearing how delicious they were and how the families stretched the hams for extra meals in the days following Thanksgiving.

Toiletries Initiative: With the help and generous donations from Parishioners, we have given out more than 600 personal care items since June, including toothbrushes, toothpaste, deodorant, razors, shampoo, soap, body wash and more. It is amazing to see a smile and appreciation from someone, after giving them items that they may otherwise have to do without. If you have any personal care items you'd like to donate, please contact Jenn or drop them off in the parish hall.

Blessing Bag Ministry: In just two months of our new Blessing Bag ministry, St. John's church members have taken more than 150 bags to distribute to people who are homeless in our community. Anecdotal feedback has been very positive - members are sharing their experiences and the common thread is that the recipients of these vital supplies and food are very appreciative of them. Many thanks to our Endowment Committee for funding the first year of this exciting new ministry!
